Information for Quaker clerks

Reviewing Britain Yearly Meeting's structures

The Group to Review Central Structures (GRCS) was set up by BYM trustees following Yearly Meeting 2023. The group was asked to look at how we could make our central structures simpler, more inclusive and sustainable.



GRCS ran a consultation in September and October. There were over 100 responses and Friends shared their hopes and fears about a possible new committee structure. Thanks to everyone who responded or who brought the consultation to the attention of others.

Friends do see the need for changes to our structures but GRCS could not find unity on a specific proposal. The group's recommendation to trustees was that this is not the right time to lay down Quaker Life and Quaker Peace and Social Witness central committees in favour of a single committee to oversee our centrally managed work. Trustees have accepted this and will not take any recommendation for structural change to Yearly Meeting in 2025.

Central committees and BYM trustees will be working together to address the need to allocate and prioritise resources better, as well as to explore how to build greater participation in Quaker work by Friends not currently engaged. 
The closing date for nominations is **Sunday 9 February 2025** – we will send out reminders in the New Year.
